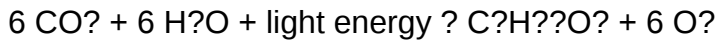

The main components needed are sunlight, water (H₂O), and carbon dioxide (CO₂). These are used by the plant to produce glucose and oxygen. Where in the plant does photosynthesis mainly occur? Photosynthesis mainly occurs in the chloroplasts, which are found in the leaves of the plant. What is the role of chlorophyll in photosynthesis? Chlorophyll is the pigment that absorbs sunlight, mainly blue and red light, and helps convert it into chemical energy during photosynthesis. What are the products of photosynthesis? The main products are glucose (a type of sugar) and oxygen. The glucose provides energy for the plant, and oxygen is released into the air.
